## **Reflect on your family traditions for Christmas.**

**Are these usually the same each year?  
Have they changed for this Christmas?**

Covid has changed many things for us this year, and for many of us, Christmas is not quite the same. You may have been unable to travel, or have family to stay. You may be in an area where you are asked to stay at home, unable even to gather for Christmas

worship. Many of us have been impacted on physically, financially, socially, spiritually or emotionally by the pandemic and its effects. Covid19 has changed the ways we do things.

**Reflect on other events in your life that have changed things for you.**

Perhaps your marriage, the birth of a child or grandchild, or when you retired. Or it could be a holiday, a book, or a chance conversation that completely turned your life upside down. Just as we can imagine that the birth of Jesus completely changed life for Mary and Joseph!



**Luke 2: 1-16**

*At that time Emperor Augustus ordered a census to be taken throughout the Roman Empire. When this first census took place, Quirinius was the governor of Syria. Everyone, then, went to register himself, each to his own hometown. Joseph went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to the town of Bethlehem in Judea, the birthplace of King David. Joseph went there because he was a descendant of David. He went to register with Mary, who was promised in marriage to him. She was pregnant, and while they were in Bethlehem, the time came for her to have her baby. She gave birth to her first son, wrapped him in cloths and laid him in a*

*manger - there was no room for them to stay in the inn. There were some shepherds in that part of the country who were spending the night in the fields, taking care of their flocks. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone over them. They were terribly afraid, but the angel said to them, "Don't be afraid! I am here with good news for you, which will bring great joy to all the people. This very day in David's town your Saviour was born - Christ the Lord! And this is what will prove it to you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." Suddenly a great army of heaven's angels appeared with the angel, singing praises to God: 2*

*"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace on earth to those with whom he is pleased!" When the angels went away from them back into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go*

*to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us." So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph and saw the baby lying in the manger.*
