

'Worship at home' April 21st 2024

We continue in the Easter season, focussing on our experience of the

risen Christ. Today is known in the church's liturgical calendar as 'Good Shepherd' Sunday, as we think about following Christ with all of our lives, and the blessings we receive. Anzac Day also falls in this coming week, and we pray for peace in a world torn apart by conflict.

Opening

Alleluia! Christ is risen:

The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul. He leads me in right paths for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod

and your staff - they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head oil; with my cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord my whole life long.

The idea of Jesus as the Good Shepherd assures us of God's unfailing care for us, as God protects and guides us through the ups and downs of life. The image is of God's constant presence and provision in abundance. It is a comforting image, and this Scripture passage is well-known and much-loved.



Sheep are known for their following instincts; people are not always so obedient. We are far more likely to stray, to wander off the track in search of greener grass, or even to run in the other direction! Following Christ, the Good Shepherd, takes

commitment, endurance and perseverance. It is not an easy short-cut path to wealth and happiness, but a call to turn the other cheek, walk the extra mile, and be willing to put aside everything, even our own lives, in order to follow.

What makes Jesus the 'Good' Shepherd? When have you found following Christ difficult? When have you found that following Christ brings new beginnings, new opportunities, abundant life?

John 10:11-18

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know

the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."
