


'Worship at home' April 7th 2024

As we worship, we are reminded that Easter was not a once-off event: the events of Easter did not signify the end, but the beginning. As the first disciples experienced Christ's ongoing presence, so do we, as his Spirit continues at work today in our world, and in our lives.

John 20:19-23

That Sunday evening the disciples were meeting behind locked doors because they were afraid of the Jewish leaders. Suddenly, Jesus was standing there among them! "Peace be with you," he said. As he spoke, he showed them the wounds in his hands and his side. They were filled with joy when they saw the

Lord! Again he said, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you." Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone's sins, they are forgiven. If you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." New Living Translation



Those disciples were hiding, in fear, shame, and grief, when the risen Christ came to them, offering peace, forgiveness and love. When we hide aspects of ourselves away, out of fear, shame or grief, the risen Christ comes to us, offering this same grace and bringing freedom and wholeness.

"Peace be with you", Jesus said to his disciples.

How might you offer peace, forgiveness and love to those around you this week?

Resurrection

John 20:24-31


One of the twelve disciples, Thomas (nicknamed the Twin), was not with the others when Jesus came. They told him, "We have seen the Lord!" But he replied, "I won't believe it unless I see the nail wounds in his hands, put my fingers into them, and place my hand into the wound in his side." Eight days later the disciples were together again, and this time Thomas was

with them. The doors were locked; but suddenly, as before, Jesus was standing among them. "Peace be with you," he said. Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and look at my hands. Put your hand into the wound in my side. Don't be faithless any longer. Believe!"
"My Lord and my God!" Thomas exclaimed.

Then Jesus told him, "You believe because you have seen me. Blessed are those who believe without seeing me." The disciples saw Jesus do many other miraculous signs in addition to the ones

Thomas wasn't ready believe that Christ had risen experienced it for until he himself. He is sometimes called 'doubting Thomas' and rebuked for not having enough faith. However, sometimes we need to ask questions, to explore what we believe, and in order to grow in our faith. Some aspects of our faith can be difficult to believe: stones rolled recorded in this book. away, bodies gone, angels from heaven, people appearing through locked doors and talking are not a part of our usual experience. This leads us to have questions and doubts.

Which aspects of your faith challenge you most? What questions do you have?

If Columbus had not doubted the maps of his day, we would never know that the world was not flat (so the story goes!). Our world has flourished because of courageous people who doubted the status quo, refused to be silenced by the nagging crowd, and believed in the possibilities of new ways of thinking.



Like Thomas, we don't simply accept what others say: we want to experience the risen Christ for ourselves. Faith is not a system of beliefs to be accepted, or a list of rules to be followed; rather faith is a relationship with God who offers each of us peace, grace, freedom and wholeness.

Doubt is not the opposite of faith: doubt can be a healthy and essential part of our faith. Doubt is what happens when we don't simply accept what we are told at face value, but really struggle to understand it for ourselves. Doubt can make us willing to let go of old ways of seeing and free us to explore new ideas, moving us from simple acceptance to a living, growing faith that encompasses our whole lives and transforms our whole beings.

Pray for

 our world: that all people, who have one Maker and Father, may acknowledge one another as brothers and sisters, without discrimination of race or nation, and with sincere hearts



- the people of Palestine and Israel; and the people of Ukraine and Russia may they find an end to their wars
- those impacted by natural disasters, floods, droughts and fires and for those struggling with conflict, poverty and starvation; and for the agencies and aid workers that continue to provide support and hope
- those who struggle with doubts and how to have faith in times of darkness and despair
