Reflect on the past week. How did you shine the light of God's love and grace to others? Did you do so intentionally, or is this simply part of who you are?

Matthew 25:14-30

The kingdom is also like what happened when a man went away and put his three servants in charge of all he owned. The man knew what each servant could do. So he handed five thousand coins to the first servant, two thousand to the second, and one thousand to the third. Then he left the country. As soon as the man had gone, the servant with the five thousand coins used them to earn five thousand more. The servant who had two thousand coins did the same

“Wonderful!” his master replied. “You are a good and faithful servant. I left you in charge of only a little, but now I will put you in charge of much more. Come and share in my happiness!”

Next, the servant who had been given two thousand coins came in and said, “Sir, you gave me two thousand coins, and I have earned two thousand more.”

You know that I harvest what I don’t plant and gather crops where I haven’t scattered seed. You could have at least put my money in the bank, so that I could have earned interest on it.” Then the master said, “Now your money will be taken away and given to the servant with ten thousand coins! Everyone who has something will be given more, and they will have more than enough. But everything will be taken from those who don’t have anything. You are a worthless servant, and you will be thrown out into the dark where people will cry and grit their teeth in pain.”

This is another of Jesus’ parables; stories which sometimes had multiple meanings and often ended with a surprise. They challenge our assumptions, and often give us more questions than they do answers.

We sometimes use the phrase, “use it or lose it”. On the surface, this parable rewards good stewardship and punishes the servant who was perhaps lazy, or fearful, or unfortunate. However, the image of God that Jesus expresses is not of a harsh and greedy landowner who punishes faithful servants and wise stewards. This story might remind us that love is a gift, not earned or deserved, which multiplies and overflows with abundance. When we fear losing what we have, we tend to hoard or hide it to protect it: when love is hidden or buried it stagnates. However, when we generously share what we have with others, we flourish, and love grows.
